

Enthroned in our Heart & Home Part 2 Sermon Guide

In this sermon, Pastor Jimmy Seibert explores how Jesus as King transforms our understanding of authority, identity and purpose — highlighting the journey from earthly citizenship to becoming adopted children in God's kingdom.

This sermon emphasizes:

- True transformation begins when we personally pursue God rather than relying on others' experiences
- Jesus' kingship extends beyond salvation to every aspect of life including work, relationships and finances
- God's kingdom operates differently than earthly kingdoms, offering both authority and intimate friendship
- As adopted children of God, we receive a new identity that transcends our natural family heritage
- The presence of God should be central in our homes and daily lives
- God's kingdom promises include provision, freedom from fear and wisdom for daily living
- Through Jesus' death and resurrection, we move from spiritual orphans to beloved children

8. What practical steps can we take to "seek first His kingdom" in our modern context?
9. How has understanding God as both King and Friend changed your approach to prayer and worship?
10. In what ways can we help each other live as "King's kids" in our community?
